Ohio's Hospice Announces Plans to Expand Services in New Building

To meet the demands of growth for Ohio's Hospice, the organization will locate mission support services and administrative offices to a new building located in Centerville.

In announcing the new location at 7575 Paragon Road in Washington Township, Ohio's Hospice President and CEO Kent Anderson indicated the new location will ease the current burden on space demands at Ohio's Hospice of Dayton Hospice House location, 324 Wilmington Avenue, enabling the Hospice House to better serve patients and families as originally intended.

The new location will serve as mission headquarters for the affiliate hospices that are members of Ohio's Hospice. Established in 2013 to strengthen and preserve the mission of community-based, not-for-profit hospices, Ohio's Hospice is a 501(3)(c) not-for-profit, tax-exempt organization. The affiliation positions not-for-profit, community hospices to compete more efficiently with investor owned for-profit hospices that have expanded significantly into the hospice market. When the affiliation was announced four years ago, the group committed to maintaining headquarters for the organization in the Dayton region.

OSHA UPDATES, AGAIN?

It happens every year. That big white envelope that arrives at your house in the mail from the Volunteer Services Department. You know what's inside. More paperwork to fill out and return. It's so easy to throw it in "the pile" intending to get to it tomorrow or sometime soon. But the "tomorrows and sometimes" are soon gone. Now the paperwork is late and you are non-compliant. So what does this all mean and why do volunteers have to fill out all that paperwork? All they really want to do is volunteer! Let me help explain.

Every year the Hospice of Dayton Volunteer Services department is required, by law, to demonstrate that its volunteers have met competency requirements set by the Occupational Safety and Health Administration (OSHA). By completing the forms received on a yearly basis, volunteers remain compliant and when an OSHA audit is performed, there are no discrepancies. However when paperwork is not returned a volunteer becomes non-compliant and if an OSHA audit were performed, Hospice of Dayton could be penalized.

It's also important to make sure you turn in your timesheets as requested, according to the volunteer position you hold. For those in direct patient care, your patient client contact forms must be turned in promptly after each visit as this is part of the patient's record and is needed to show compliancy. For those filling out the monthly form, it's important that you document all hours in the month and calculate your total on the front of the form so we can properly report our numbers to our Leadership Team.

So when that OSHA envelope arrives, rip it open with renewed enthusiasm. After your visits, fill out those timesheets and send them in. This becomes your ticket to compliant volunteering. It doesn't take much time to complete and your volunteer staff is always happy to assist you with any questions you might have.

Best Practices!

Recently, Ohio's Hospice welcomed two Joint Commission surveyors on our campus. We did really well on the survey and we got some great news! The surveyors were impressed by our volunteer timesheets and have recognized them as a 'best practice!'

What does this mean? The 'Leading Practice Library' is a complimentary tool for those accredited by Joint Commission. The documents in the national library have been successfully implemented by health care organizations that support safety and quality health care and can be used as a resource to aid other accredited organizations.

Our department should feel honored to be asked to include our forms in this library!
