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The Power of Social Media: Frank the Christmas Gargoyle

When a local woman stopped at a roadside garden center, a large concrete statue of a gargoyle caught her attention. Finding it amusing and whimsical, she paid \$50 for the gargoyle. She brought it home, placed it on the porch, and named it Frank. During the holidays, she gave Frank a Santa hat to wear.

However, there was one neighbor who was not a fan of Frank and asked that he be moved inside. Instead, Frank's owner created a Facebook page called Frank the Christmas Gargoyle. Frank's owner posted a picture of Frank in a new outfit every day as a virtual gargoyle advent. Frank's page quickly gained more than 700,000 followers.

With Frank's newfound fame, his owner decided to pay it forward by posting a new picture of Frank with a link to donate to the Dayton Foodbank. In 10 minutes, Frank's followers raised \$10,000. Over the next few weeks and months, Frank the Christmas Gargoyle helped raise more than \$150,000 for local and national charities.

"I didn't intend to continue the Facebook page after Christmas, but every post was more successful than the last," said Frank's owner who has chosen to remain anonymous. "If some silly decorations were helping these worthy causes, I was hard-pressed to stop."

This spring, Frank's owner had a friend with a relative in the care of Ohio's Hospice of Dayton. In honor of Nurses Month in May, Frank's owner decided to promote donations to Ohio's Hospice of Dayton on the Frank the Christmas Gargoyle Facebook page. Thanks to Frank's generous followers, the page raised more than \$34,000! "Ohio's Hospice of Dayton took great care of my mother a few years ago," Frank's owner said. "I know she would be following along and making costumes for Frank to wear. This was a great way to pay back the organization for their care."

Although Frank the Christmas Gargoyle started as a joke, the power of social media helped Frank and his owner make a significant impact in the Dayton community. After a difficult year, Frank and his owner have helped many other organizations and people. They also have brought joy to his many followers. Frank's owner said that Frank was the best \$50 purchase she has ever made.

Pathways of Hope[™] Provides Grief Support to Children and Teens Who Have Lost a Parent

At Ohio's Hospice of Dayton, we're grateful to our Pathways of HopesM grief counseling staff who have continued to provide bereavement services in a variety of safe and approachable ways for patients, families and our community, as well as our teammates, as we navigate the pandemic together.

During this time, we have seen children and teens who need additional support and attention as they cope with the loss of a parent or close relative. Nationwide, an estimated 40,000 children and teens have lost a parent due to the COVID-19 pandemic. Because of the pandemic, they may not have been able to visit their loved one in the hospital, to have the opportunity to say goodbye, or to be with them when they died.

^{Ohio's Hospice of Dayton} These children and teens are at a greater risk of experiencing traumatic grief, depression, poor educational outcomes, and unintentional death or suicide. They may express their grief through withdrawal, fearfulness, anxiety, irritability, argumentativeness, lack of concentration, poor school performance, and substance abuse.

Through Pathways of Hope, the bereavement counseling professionals of Ohio's Hospice of Dayton offer children and teens additional support and attention as they cope with grief during the COVID-19 pandemic. Pathways of Hope services are available to the friends and family of all Ohio's Hospice of Dayton patients, as well as anyone in the public, free of charge, thanks to generous support from the community we are privileged to serve.
